Hand-building Pottery Tips & Techniques

- Clay drys quickly, so keep unused clay in container when not in use to prevent drying out.
- Pay attention to create uniform thickness all over and thin rim at end. Feel with eyes closed.
- Rub out cracks as soon as they develop to prevent them from getting too large and hard to repair.
- When slab-building, turn the slab over with every few rolls. This allows it to roll out easier.
- **Don't roll thinner than 1/4" (use wood slats)** or it will be difficult to support during construction. Thinning will happen as you add texture and you can thin the rim at the end.
- Clay is slippery when wet and difficult to control detail, so try not to use water if you can avoid it.
- You don't need to use slip coil-building. You do need to smooth it at least on the inside so that it will hold together. You can leave the outside coils visible or smooth them together.
- Score & Slip when joining edges of slabs or adding decorative features (scratching up both edges & adding just enough slip/paste-like clay to cover scratch marks). This acts like a clay glue. Using too much slip makes it difficult to work with so wipe excess away rather than smear it around.
- When adding decorative features with slip, wiggle & chant magic words while applying gentle pressure until you **feel slip attaching like glue**.
- Rinse hands in bucket & dry if fingers are slippery or coated with dry clay. **Keep hands clean & dry** for best results in smoothing clay and adding finishing touches like thinning the rim.
